# The Third Sunday in Lent March 3, 2024

## **OUR REDEEMER PRACTICES CLOSED COMMUNION**

The Sacrament of the Altar is the body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ under the bread and wine for us Christians to eat and drink, instituted by Christ Himself. As we receive this Sacrament, the oneness of fellowship at the Altar (I Corinthians 10:17) presupposes a oneness in doctrine with the Apostles (Acts 2:42). For this reason the congregations of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod have agreed to follow the Biblical and historical practice of Closed Communion. If you desire to receive the Lord's Supper and are not a communicant member of Our Redeemer or a sister congregation in the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, we respectfully ask that you not commune this morning. Rather, we would invite you to speak with Pastor Knox, Pastor Saunders, or Vicar Baker about Holy Communion and about becoming a communicant member of this congregation.





<u>TODAY IS THE THIRD SUNDAY IN LENT.</u> We have now passed through the early stages of the Lenten journey as we move with Jesus toward His passion. For most of the Church Year, the Gospel readings have come from the Gospel of Mark. This week and next, the Gospel readings will be from the Evangelist John's Gospel.

In some ways, this breaks the chronological order of the events of Jesus' life. In Mark, we were progressing from the Mountain of the Transfiguration toward Jerusalem where Jesus would be "betrayed into the hands of wicked men, be crucified, and on the third day rise." With the switch to John's

Gospel, we move from a time line of Jesus' life to a more thematic preparation for Holy Week. Today, we behold Jesus in Jerusalem, in the temple, where He drives the money changers and sellers of animals from His Father's house.

Jesus did this on at least two occasions. In the Gospels of Matthew, Mark, and Luke, Jesus does this during the week of His passion. In John's account, this takes place right at the beginning of His public ministry, some three years earlier. Regardless of which account we read, all place the cleansing of the temple during the observance of the Passover. It is easy to think that Jesus may have done this every Passover during His public ministry.

This picture of Jesus, the one with whip in hand driving animals and people from the temple, is likely not the fondest picture you have of your Savior. But here, in a small way, you have the picture of Jesus "who will come again with glory to judge the living and the dead." The Old Testament reading, leading you to hear again the commandments of God from Exodus, reminds you how you need to be cleansed because of your sins against God and your neighbor.

The people of Jesus' day asked, "Give us a sign to prove that you have authority to do all of this." In figurative language, Jesus answers them by speaking of tearing down the temple and rebuilding it in three days. The people did not understand that He was speaking of His death and resurrection and not the building of stone there in Jerusalem.

The people of Jesus' day could not understand this event until after the sign of His resurrection had been given. The people of today cannot understand it either, apart from this same sign. So how is this sign given today? St. Paul tells us in the Epistle, "Jews demand signs and Greeks look for wisdom, but we preach Christ crucified." It is in the preaching of Christ crucified that people come to and are sustained in the Faith and thus are cleansed from their sins. The resurrected Christ continues to give the sign of His resurrection in His body and blood in the Sacrament of the Altar.

This sign has been given. Jesus died and has been raised again. He will come again to judge the living and the dead. In the meantime, the temple of His body, the Church, continues to be cleansed, not with whip and cord, but with His Word and through communion with His body and blood for the forgiveness of sins.







# CATECHISM OF THE WEEK The Office of the Keys and Confession

What is the Office of the Keys?

It is the peculiar church power which Christ has given to His Church on earth to forgive the sins of penitent sinners, but to retain the sins of the impenitent as long as they do not repent.

Where is this written?

Thus writes the holy Evangelist John, chapter twentieth: The Lord Jesus breathed on His disciples and saith unto them, Receive ye the Holy Ghost. Whosesoever sins ye remit, they are remitted unto them; and whosesoever sins ye retain, they are retained.

What do you believe according to these words?

I believe that, when the called ministers of Christ deal with us by His divine command, especially when they exclude manifest and impenitent sinners from the Christian congregation, and, again, when they absolve those who repent of their sins and are willing to amend, this is as valid and certain, in heaven also, as if Christ, our dear Lord, dealt with us Himself.

What is Confession?

Confession embraces two parts. One is that we confess our sins; the other, that we receive absolution, or forgiveness, from the pastor as from God Himself, and in no wise doubt, but firmly believe, that by it our sins are forgiven before God in heaven.

What sins should we confess?

Before God we should plead guilty of all sins, even of those which we do not know, as we do in the Lord's Prayer; but before the pastor we should confess those sins only which we know and feel in our hearts.

Which are these?

Here consider your station according to the Ten Commandments, whether you are a father, mother, son, daughter, master, mistress, servant; whether you have been disobedient, unfaithful, slothful; whether you have grieved any person by word or deed; whether you have stolen, neglected, or wasted aught, or done other injury.
