OUR REDEEMER PRACTICES CLOSED COMMUNION

The Sacrament of the Altar is the body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ under the bread and wine for us Christians to eat and drink, instituted by Christ Himself. As we receive this Sacrament, the oneness of fellowship at the Altar (I Corinthians 10:17) presupposes a oneness in doctrine with the Apostles (Acts 2:42). For this reason the congregations of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod have agreed to follow the Biblical and historical practice of Closed Communion. If you desire to receive the Lord's Supper and are not a communicant member of Our Redeemer or a sister congregation in the Lutheran



Church-Missouri Synod, we respectfully ask that you not commune this morning. Rather, we would invite you to speak with Pastor Knox, Pastor Saunders, or Vicar Goodroad about Holy Communion and about becoming a communicant member of this congregation.

TODAY IS THE 4th SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST Jesus says to the twelve, "Whoever confesses me before men, I will also confess him before my Father in heaven. But whoever denies me before men, I will deny him before my Father in heaven." What Jesus says to the apostles, applies to all pastors and even to all Christians.

In the Epistle to the Romans, the Apostle Paul writes, "For with the heart one believes unto righteousness, and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation." This truth should be clear: Believing and confessing go hand in hand!

Believing is the result of God's work. "I believe that I cannot by my own reason or strength believe in Jesus Christ my Lord, or come to Him." You recognize those words from the Small Catechism's

explanation of the Third Article of the Creed. But the catechism continues as it explains that, what you are unable to do, God the Holy Spirit has done: "But the Holy Ghost has called me by the Gospel, enlightened me with His gifts, sanctified and kept me in the true faith; even as He calls, gathers, enlightens, and sanctifies the whole Christian church on earth, and keeps it with Jesus Christ in the one true faith;"

Just as believing is the work of God, so is confessing. "Therefore I tell you that no one who is speaking by the Spirit of God says, 'Jesus be cursed,' and no one can say, 'Jesus is Lord,' except by the Holy Spirit." (I Cor. 12:3)

Confessing and persecution also go hand in hand. Jesus says to those who make the Spirit enabled confession of His name, "The student is not above his teacher." By these words, Jesus is not only teaching His disciples to be humble. He is preparing them for the life of cross bearing which He and they will share. This life can be scary. Jesus knows the fears and doubts that you have which lead you to remain silent when you should be confessing His name in word and deed. In compassion for your weakness He says, "Do not be afraid." He says this not once, not twice, but three times.

There is only one you need to fear - your gracious God and Lord. You have taken up the cross of Jesus in Holy Baptism where you were marked with the cross and buried with Christ. To daily bear that cross is to live the life of repentance, that is, living in constant and utter dependence upon God for all things temporal and eternal. This is what it means to "fear and love God."

You confess that dependence today as you come, at the gracious invitation of Him who was killed and on the third day raised to life, to feed on His body and blood for the forgiveness of sins. This is the source of the Christian life for "where there is forgiveness of sins, there is also life and salvation."







THE AUGSBURG CONFESSION

Most people don't know that today, June 25, is a very important date in the history of the Christian Church and for us Lutherans in particular. On this day in the year 1530, thirteen years after Luther posted the 95 Theses, and 10 years after Luther stood trial in Worms, declaring he would not recant his teachings, the Augsburg Confession was presented to the Emperor Charles V. Unfortunately, for many Lutherans, the response might be, "The Augsburg what?"

To make a comparison to the history of the United States, that reaction would be similar to knowing the date and events of the Boston Tea Party (December 16, 1773), or Paul Revere's ride before the Battle at Lexington and Concord (April 18, 1775) yet as you are eating a hot dog and watching fireworks this coming July 4, asking "The Declaration of what?"

I make the comparison to American history because of the great similarity between the signing of the Declaration of Independence and the presentation of the Augsburg Confession. Each event involved great personal risk for those who took part. The Founding Fathers who signed the Declaration of Independence were accused of treason. As John Adams told his fellow delegates: "We must hang together, or we will hang apart."

The confessors at Augsburg faced no less a threat. They were advocating a doctrine that the Roman Church had declared heretical, and the Emperor Charles V was the instrument which the Papacy intended to use to suppress and eliminate the Reformation teaching by force. The princes and leaders who presented the Augsburg Confession were risking their life and property – a fact that became clear just seventeen years later when Charles V attacked and conquered them.

One of the Reformation princes, George, Margrave of Brandenburg, spoke boldly to the emperor that day, saying "Before I let anyone take from me the word of God and ask me to deny my God, I will kneel and let them strike off my head."

The Confessors at Augsburg relied on the promise of God's word, the same word which you heard today when Jesus said, "So everyone who acknowledges me before men, I also will acknowledge before my Father who is in heaven, but whoever denies me before men, I also will deny before my Father who is in heaven." (Matthew 10:32)

After the Augsburg Confession was presented and read publicly, one of the princes who sided with the Papacy, William of Bavaria said: "I've been misinformed about what you Lutherans teach." He then asked Dr. Eck, the leading catholic theologian arguing against the Reformation teaching, if he could discredit the Lutheran position. Eck replied that he could not by using only Scripture. Prince William was stunned: "Do you mean to say that the Lutherans are sitting inside the Scriptures and we outside of them?"

The answer to that question is clear – yes! The summary of Christian doctrine we confess in the Augsburg Confession sits squarely, firmly, and only, in and on the Word of God.

The Augsburg Confession consists of twenty-eight articles of doctrine. The first twenty-one articles outline what the Reformers believed were the most important teachings in Lutheranism, drawn from the Bible, to clearly confess salvation by grace through faith in Jesus Christ alone. The last seven articles identify some of the errors and abuses of the Roman Catholic Church and provide arguments for needed reforms.

The Augsburg Confession remains one of the most influential documents to come out of the Reformation. Its articles of faith are as well-defined and biblically sound today as they were nearly 500 years ago. It, along with the rest of the Book of Concord, are the faithful summary which define our doctrine and practice as a congregation.
