OUR REDEEMER PRACTICES CLOSED COMMUNION

The Sacrament of the Altar is the body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ under the bread and wine for us Christians to eat and drink, instituted by Christ Himself. As we receive this Sacrament, the oneness of fellowship at the Altar (I Corinthians 10:17) presupposes a oneness in doctrine with the Apostles (Acts 2:42). For this reason the congregations of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod have agreed to follow the Biblical and historical practice of Closed Communion. If you desire to receive the Lord's Supper and are not a communicant member of Our Redeemer or a sister congregation in the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, we respectfully ask that you not commune this morning. Rather, we would



invite you to speak with Pastor Knox, Pastor Saunders, or Vicar Baker about Holy Communion and about becoming a communicant member of this congregation.

TODAY IS THE 14th SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST The Gospel appointed for this day in the Church year is from the 16th chapter of Matthew's Gospel. Earlier in this same chapter, you heard Peter's great confession that Jesus is "the Christ, the Son of the living God." Jesus called Peter "blessed" because he had received this truth from his heavenly Father.

How quickly things change. Today Peter completely changes course by rebuking Jesus. As Jesus declares that He must suffer, be killed, and be raised on the third day Peter thinks he has a better plan. In Peter's mind, this was not the way to establish the kingdom that Jesus had been preaching about these past three years. Although Peter had good intentions, Satan used those intentions for evil, as he so often does with you.

Peter pressed Jesus to follow the road of glory and this was not the first time that such a temptation had been set before Jesus. Recall that shortly after His baptism, He had heard the same lies from Satan in the wilderness and so, once again, "for us and for our salvation," Jesus overcomes the father of lies, "Get behind me Satan!"

Jesus set His eyes on the cross, and bore that cross for you, so that you could be free of Satan once and for all. Jesus would take up His cross to give you, His disciples, life and salvation. Jesus also tells you that you must take up your cross and follow Him. This is not easy for you as a child of God. Peter wasn't just thinking of Jesus when he said, "Never, Lord, this shall never happen to you!" Peter was thinking of himself. Peter knew full well that as it was for Jesus, so it would be for those who were His disciples.

Jesus bore the cross of Calvary and died the sinner's death to redeem you from all sin, from death, and from the power of the devil. The cross you are now called to bear does not redeem you, for that has already been accomplished by Christ your Lord. The cross you now bear reveals you as one who has been redeemed by Christ, for you were marked with the cross of Christ in Holy Baptism. It is Christ who now lives in you. Today Jesus strengthens you to carry your cross by reminding you of your baptism, by the preaching of His Word, and by giving you His body and blood. Even as you bear the cross, Jesus' words still ring loud and clear, "Blessed are you."

AS YOU WAIT FOR THE SERVICE TO BEGIN, turn in your bulletin to the Hymn of the Day - "Oh, Love, How Deep" #544. As you read the verses of this hymn, take note of the author's repeated use of the phrase "for us." The Hymn writer reminds you that Jesus' entire life, including His overcoming the temptation of Satan, is done "for us" and for our salvation. This morning we will sing 2 additional verses of this hymn. They will be sung as verses 7 and 8. Written by one of our members, Sara Lair, these verses remind us that Jesus "for us" is present in the Sacraments of Baptism and the Lord's Supper.










<u>ADULT BIBLE STUDY OF THE BOOK OF REVELATION</u> Next Sunday, September 10, Pastor Knox will begin a study of the Book of Revelation. It has been more than 20 years since a study of this unique book of the Bible has been offered at Our Redeemer. The study of Revelation will include a study of parts of the book of Daniel from the Old Testament, a book which has similarities with Revelation. Both of these forward looking books of prophecy give the believer confidence as God reveals the glory of His eternal kingdom and the final victory to be enjoyed by all who trust in Christ.

VICAR'S BIBLE STUDY THIS YEAR There's no denying many of us today have a much different relationship with soil and plants than people typically have had throughout most of history. Some of us get our hands dirty in the garden and enjoy the "fruit of our labors," but gardening is more a hobby than a necessity. On the other hand, farmers' livelihoods do depend on the productivity of their cropland, yet much of their work is done with computers, machinery, and other technology only available within the last 130 years or so. Given the populace's more intimate familiarity with the land during Biblical times, it's not surprising that we can find agricultural descriptions, both literal and figurative, in every section of the Scriptures.

This series doesn't propose to be an exhaustive examination of all these passages. For instance, more attention will be paid to horticulture and botany in general than to animal husbandry. Over the course of 17 sessions, from September to May, we'll discuss texts from Genesis to Revelation, some very familiar and others sometimes overlooked. We'll read selections in which plants play the leading role and discover new insights hidden "in the weeds." The goal is to gain a better understanding of how plant imagery is used in specific contexts as well as being a linking theme throughout the Scriptures.

SMALL CATECHISM FOR THE WEEKSecond Article of The Apostles Creed & Meaning

What is the second article of the Creed?

And in Jesus Christ, His only Son, our Lord; Who was conceived by the Holy Ghost, Born of the Virgin Mary; Suffered under Pontius Pilate, Was crucified, dead, and buried; He descended into hell; The third day He rose again from the dead; He ascended into heaven and sitteth on the right hand of God the Father Almighty; from thence He shall come to judge the quick and the dead.

What does this mean?

I believe that Jesus Christ, true God, begotten of the Father from eternity, and also true man, born of the Virgin Mary, is my Lord,

who has redeemed me, a lost and condemned creature, purchased and won me from all sins, from death, and from the power of the devil; not with gold or silver, but with His holy, precious blood and with His innocent suffering and death,

that I may be His own, and live under Him in His kingdom, and serve Him in everlasting righteousness, innocence, and blessedness

even as He is risen from the dead, lives and reigns to all eternity. This is most certainly true.

An excerpt from Celebrating the Saints by Rev. William Weedon. This book is available in the Church Library.

The festival of Saints Peter and Paul is one of the very oldest saints' days in the Church's calendar. Christians have remembered these two on June 29 since at least AD 250. A very old tradition holds that both apostles were martyred the same day under orders from emperor Nero in AD 68.

Peter, of course, during Christ's Passion had <u>denied</u> his Lord three times out of fear. When Christ restored Peter in John 21, he asked him if he loved him three times. Three times Peter confessed that he loved Christ like a brother. He apparently hesitated to use the word for <u>love (agape)</u> that entails willingness to lay down one's life. Christ charged him to feed his lambs and tend his flock. The Lord Jesus, however, did go on to tell Peter that the day would come when he *will* stretch out his hands, have another dress him, and lead him where he does not want to go. "This he said to show by what kind of death he was to glorify God" (John 21:19), and added the invitation: "Follow me." Peter was thus given the promise that he would die a martyr for his Master.

When that time came, Peter was in Rome (called by the code name "Babylon," 1 Peter 5:13). He had witnessed Christ's resurrection to Jews and Gentiles for many years, confessing to one and all, "We believe that we will be saved through the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ" (Acts 15:11). He was arrested and sentenced to death by crucifixion. He reportedly begged only the favor of being crucified upside down. He did not feel worthy to die in the exact same manner as the One he had once denied.

The remains of Peter and Paul are said to be interred beneath the original St. Peter's Basilica in Rome. Together they await the joyous resurrection that they fearlessly proclaimed.

Merciful and eternal God, Your holy apostles Peter and Paul received grace and strength to lay down their lives for the sake of Your Son. Strengthen us by Your Holy Spirit that we may confess Your truth and at all times be ready to lay down our lives for Him who laid down His life for us, even Jesus Christ, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.
